PRELUDE

2. Laughs and Plays

When we select games, we aim to engage all types of students.

4. Rehearses Activities

We plan carefully and practice to ensure that all activities work the way we want

5. Utilizes Participating Leaders

Our youth léaders participate in group activities and stage games regularly.

WORSHIP

1. Implements Consistent Sessions

We invite students to worship and respond to God on a weekly basis.

2. Shares Fostering Prayers

We help students grow in prayers, building up their understanding and abilities to pray.

3. Creates Smooth Transitions

Leaders engage students between songs and during program transition.

4. Uses Program Variety

We create different types of experiences to help every kind of students responding to God.

5. Uses Relatable Lyrics

Most students can understand and relate to the lyrics in our selection of worship songs.

6. Utilizes Prepared Leaders

We encourage worship leaders and equip them to grow, both in musical abilities and leadership.

7. Worships By Example

Leaders and volunteers participate in worship alongside students, to show their own faith and responses to God.

TRANSITIONS

1. Starts On Time

We start on time and have a trigger to help students get ready.

2. Plans Smooth Transitions

Leaders plan transitions each week to make sure they are well thought out.

3. Utilizes Team Involvement

We practice transitions and talk through them as a team.

4. Implements Precise Timing

Our transition from prelude to social is engaging, inclusive and not too long.

5. Uses Attention Grabbers

During the transition into the main message, we can keep students from distraction and allow necessary shifts.

There's minimal "dead time" during our programs.

7. Recoups Focus

Our transition after games helps our students refocus their energy.



STORY

1. Is Beneficial / Appropriate

Our messages convey theological truth and are developmentally appropriate / helpful to students.

2. Has Realistic Perspective

We understand that the purpose is not to resolve all tension or to tie every situation up in a bow.

3. Inspires Conversations

The content of our messages set up our small group conversations for success.

4. Has Practical Balance

Messages have a good balance between theological depth and real-life applications.

5. Addresses Needs

Our content is developed and delivered with the specific needs of each student phase in mind.

6. Offers Considerate Approach

What is taught and how it is taught is based on what is helpful for our students, instead of adult perspectives and feelings.

7. Uses Diversified Team

The makeup of our teaching team allows students to often see themselves in someone on stage, as well as those who are different from them.

GROUP

1. Invests And Equips

The student ministry spends time and resources recruiting, training, investing in and equipping our group leaders to be effective.

2. Utilizes Flexible Delivery

Our small group leaders understand that they can adjust curriculum wordings to help the success of their weekly groups.

3. Shows Up Weekly

Volunteers and small group leaders do show up weekly (within reason).

4. Has Committed Presence

Small group leaders are committed to the same middle school or high school group for over a phase in life, not just for a year.

5. Facilitates Not Dominates

We work with group leaders so they understand their role in facilitating conversations, not dominating them or reteaching a content.

6. Creates Safe Environments

Our groups have a sense of safety. Students know this is where any and all conversations can take place.

7. Demonstrates Patience

We give time and allow room, in order for small groups to grow influence.

HOME

1. Encourages Parental Involvement

Parents are encouraged to play a role in the spiritual lives of our students.

2. Creates Topic Awareness

Parents are aware of what we talk about each week, and how to continue those conversations at home.

3. Provides Resource Assistance

We equip parents to lead their students spiritually by providing resources.

4. Encourages Relationship With Leaders

Our parents form personal relationships with their students' small group leaders.

5. Practices Discipleship

We provide resources for students to practice spiritual discipleship throughout the week.
